Kolkata: Dola is a "negative" child of an HIV-positive mother. But, the world has not spared her for a mistake which was never hers. She was forced to take a transfer from the school.

She is a child without any HIV infection but suffers the stigma everyday. Simply because her mother Nisha is an HIV+ patient.

Samir Biswas has endured the virus for 17 years. "The doctor who detected it suggested I commit suicide to escape the ordeal," said Biswas.

In India, about 5.3 million people are effected with the virus and more than a lakh are AIDS victims. Nearly 40% of victims are in the 15-20 vears age bracket. It's they who face the brunt of the stigma. Youngsters turned up in the programme Reach Out, Reach Out for Us organised at Nazrul Manch by Sukriti Foundation and co-sponsored by The Times of India.

Though several AIDS awareness programmes have been organised, this is perhaps the first instance where victims interacted with the audience directly. Bangla band Fossils also presented a special song titled Eka Nauo for the cause. Music is a method to reach out to people and create a bond between HIV+ patients and the rest of the society," said Rupam, lead singer for the band.

Julekha Bibi, Farzana Begum and many others had similar experiences to recount. There were 14 HIV+ participants who took turns narrating moments from their lives to hearty applause.
